Tidbits about Guatemala: The earliest human settlements in Guatemala date back to the Paleo-Indian period and were made up of hunters and gatherers. Sites dating back to 6500 BC have been found. The Mayan civilization (2,000 BC - 250 AD) was among those that flourished in the region. Guatemala was part of the Captaincy General of Guatemala for nearly 300 years; this Captaincy, included the territories of Chiapas, Mexico, and the modern countries of Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua and Costa Rica. The size of Guatemala is currently 42,042 square miles, slightly smaller than the state of Tennessee. Guatemala is bordered by Mexico, Belize, Honduras, and El Salvador. On the southwest coast is the Pacific Ocean and the Caribbean Sea is on the east coast. Though Spanish is the official language, there are 25 other indigenous languages spoken. In the Mayan language, Guatemala means, "land of many trees". The population of the Republic is approximately 15.8 million, the most highly populated country in Central America. From 1960 to 1996, Guatemala underwent a bloody civil war. The Peace Treaty was signed six months after we moved here.
